

Finnish I Final Study Sheet

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1. I speak English really well and a little Finnish.
2. Who are you? Is your name Pekka?
3. I am not Pekka. My name is Beauregard.
4. Are you studying Finnish? You speak Finnish rather well.
5. The question is: who am I? Am I a Finn? Am I not a Finn?
6. Pardon, what is the teacher saying? – He is not talking, he is reading.
7. Are the students in the room or outside? – The Finnish course is inside.
8. The students are sitting in the park, but the teacher is already at the course.
9. Is that a photograph on the table? – No, it is a notebook.
10. Is this your country? In which country do you live? – I live in Finland now, in Helsinki.
11. Who is at home now? – My mother is there. She is sitting at the table.
12. What is on the table? – It is a Finnish¹ book, but she isn't reading it [sitä].
13. She speaks English well and she reads a little Finnish. I want to study Finnish too.
14. When is she in the university? – She is sometimes at a good course on Friday.
15. Saturday is my free day and we sit in the store when it is open.
16. We are at work every day. On Saturday and Sunday too we stand in the shop.
17. When do you begin? – We begin at eight o'clock and our day ends sometimes at fifteen o'clock.
18. In which shop is that? – It is in a bookshop on Birch Road near the school's main building.
19. What school? – It is the school that is open only in October.
20. Do you want to sit outside? – We are already in the big park.
21. where is my Finnish language book? Is it on the little table or in my room?
22. Who is on the telephone? Whose number is one-five-three-eight-four? Is the telephone in the university's main building?
23. On which street do they live? Is it the street where the diligent teachers live?

25. Which country's main city is Helsinki? I was in Helsinki on my vacation. Isn't it in France or was it in Sweden? – Isn't it in Finland?
26. What is she doing today? – She would like to sit at home, but now she is standing outside and is speaking with a friend on the telephone.
27. I would also like to go out, walk in the big park, and play soccer.
28. I read, write, ask, answer, and listen to music when I study.
29. In the evening we drink beer in a good restaurant.
30. On Friday is a quiz [**tentti**] and the students study a lot.
31. I would like to learn Swedish. We live in Vaasa and the people speak Swedish here.
32. If I work here, I need to study Swedish too.
33. Can we ask something? – Yes, what is it? – May we drink coffee in the park restaurant?
34. Yesterday we sat in the big library all day and chatted.
35. What are we doing today? – We can study Finnish or play tennis. What would you like to do?
36. If your father is on the bus, you can't speak with him now. He goes by bus to the workplace.
37. If your friend lives near the station, she can walk to the train.
38. If you know a secret [**salaisuksen**], you can be sure [**varma**] that the people know about it [**siitä**].

40. Who said that to you? – I don't remember. Maybe the neighbor's boy said it [**sen**] to my mother.
41. When I get into the bus I have to stand until [**ennen kuin**] the people say, "Sit!"
42. It suffices if I disturb her [**häntä**] tomorrow. I have to ask her if she is waking up at six o'clock on Friday.
