

# Finnish II Final Study Sheet

1. Who is at home? – My mother is there now and is sitting at the table. On the table is a good Finnish book, but she isn't reading it. She is listening to music.
2. The days when they are at work are Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday. They don't need to sit in their Finnish language course then, because it is on Monday, on Wednesday, and on Friday.
3. We begin in the little shop at eight o'clock and our day ends sometimes at six o'clock. What shop is that? – It is a bookshop on a little street near the old school.
4. I would like to know where my Finnish language book is. Is it on the little shelf or in my room? Whose notebook is on the chair in the lecture hall? Is it yours?
5. Are they going out today? The stores are open but the post office isn't. – They would like to drink coffee at four o'clock in the university's cafeteria.
6. May I drink beer in your sauna? – No, don't do it inside! You must stand outside if you drink beer. Go out!
7. Come here and say what your name is! Are you from Turku? – No, I come from Lappeenranta, but I am often in Turku. Why are you asking? – Listen! I am the person who is asking. Answer! – I don't need to answer. Who are you?
8. Do the people leave by bus from Lahti tomorrow? – They got off the bus in Helsinki on Mannerheimin Road today. They are at a movie now.
9. When do you study? – I read and write in the evening, then I sleep eight hours. My little girl wakes up at five o'clock, runs into the room, sits at the table, and would like to eat something.
10. Timo thinks that it is pleasant when he and Kirsi meet on the street and chat. Timo always begins and asks 'How's it going?' Kirsi would then say 'Just fine' or 'Not anything special.' He would always ask 'Do you still live in the apartment complex? What is your address?' She would say 'You disturb me when you ask. I don't want to answer.'
11. They take a walk and eat in a good restaurant. – What do you want to do? Timo asks. – I want to read in the library, she says. – Yesterday too was the same program. You studied and read and wrote. Why don't we go into the sauna? – No thanks, she answers.
12. Today Anna's workday in school begins at eight o'clock.
13. She travels from Helsinki to Vantaa by train and walks from the station to the school.
14. The train leaves Helsinki at seven fifty-seven and arrives at Martinlaakso at eight seventeen. The trip takes twenty minutes.
15. Anni's trip from the station to home takes fifteen minutes and she is at home at about sixteen o'clock.

16. Today Anni leaves home at seven thirty and returns home at sixteen. How many hours was Anni away from home?
17. Today we are traveling to the countryside. Jorma and Tuula Virtanen's house is in a little village there.
18. Jorma and Tuula have two sons and a daughter. Jorma's mother has an apartment on the second floor in the same house.
19. Jorma is a salesperson in a store, and Tuula works in the post office. Jorma's mother is a pensioner.
20. Tuula's mother and father live in Lappeenranta, where they both work in a big paper factory.
21. Does the family have a car? – Yes, but they travel by train when they want to visit a city.
22. We don't have a little girl. They have two tall boys Pentti and Pekka and two warm cats.
23. The older boy Pentti is much shorter than the others and he doesn't have a bicycle.
24. They have their own room in our house, but it is smaller than they would want.
25. Pekka is younger than Pentti. He doesn't have a car or [eikä] mopo.
26. Their house, in which there are five rooms and kitchen, is bigger. Our family lives in an old house where we don't have a bathroom, kitchen, or sauna.
27. What were you talking about? – We were talking about a new house on the street on which we live.
28. The new neighbors who live in the house came out and talked with us about their jobs.
29. The younger girl said to me that she likes her job, but the older doesn't like work in a hot, old factory.
30. Who likes factories? The new factories and the modern [moderni-] workplaces are not bad, but I like a quiet library.
31. They asked me why I am studying Finnish. I told them that I like big puzzles [palpeli (banana word)].
32. Ask her if there are old churches and large factories in the little city where she lives.
33. Call me if there is work there for us. We would like to know how many weeks we can work.
34. Do you have young children? How many little boys do you have?
35. I want to show you nice pictures from my trip to Finland. Here are two lakes in which there is a lot of cold water.
36. When we ask them, they don't say anything to us. We would like to know, for example, how many brown [ruskea] horses they have.
37. We have rugs on the floor, old and new chairs, little and big tables, windows, and bookshelves in our new house.
38. We don't have a bathroom. We just have a shower room. We live in an old house, in which there are five rooms.
39. Our house is next to the big railroad station. We listen to trains when we sleep.
40. The trains and the people come and go. Sometimes we too travel by train on vacation when we have free time.

41. Many people, many dogs, and many cats disturb us when they stand at the station.
42. The new Finnish houses are big and modern. They have [= in them are] many doors and windows and the kitchens are large with big refrigerators and lots of shelves.
43. The students have only old books. Can't they buy new books? – No, the new books are too expensive. Old books are cheap but we don't have cheap things.
44. There are many tables and chairs in rooms where we sit and study. The tables are from England and the chairs are Danish. The color of the tables is blue and the color of the bookcases is yellow.
45. The teacher must speak so that the students understand what she says in the course. Teachers don't talk so that I understand. Do you understand what they say?
46. Little children sleep a lot even when [**vaikkakin**] we hear cars and trains outside. They don't sleep in the evening when we want to read books and newspapers.
47. I read in [= out of] the newspapers about sports on the weekend. When I lived in Jyväskylä I liked matches in which the Finns won [**voitta-**].
48. We spoke with friends whose boys play tennis. Many boys like that sport.
49. What was on television? We often see Finnish programs about Egyptian movies and listen to a conversation about new books.
50. We watched a movie about a young man who asked people about dogs and snakes [**käärme**].
