CHAUCER

One of the major themes of *The Knight's Tale* is the role of ritual, ceremony, and formality (order) in controlling expressions of violence and sexual impulse. For Chaucer, this relation between apparent disorder and evident order at the human level also exists at the cosmic level; the apparent disorder of human life exemplified in the plot is set against the evident order of Providence and Destiny.

Chaucer has given us a plot that seems to jump from one event to the other. The apparent disorder fills us with a sense of unease. But as we read along, we find that events and images are repeated, and a sense of order seems to emerge in the background. That combination of unease in disorder and confidence in the sure hand of the author is one of great effects of *The Knight's Tale*.
